Joe rushes to the tryout, and even in his street clothes outclasses everyone there except for a ghost from his past, a Russian named Hristo, who caves in Joe's ribs with an elbow and ends his chances of making the team.


Joe gets a call from his brother Kevin, who is anxious to make amends for past sins. Joe comes to Detroit, a post-apocalyptic wasteland where shining casinos tower over crumbling ruins and tumbleweeds roll down the streets. Joe is introduced to Eddie, a young soccer phenom with one foot in the game, and another foot in the world of gangs and drugs.

The best street soccer players in the world are descending on Detroit for a high-stakes, underground tournament, and this includes Joe's nemesis-Hristo. Wealthy and powerful gamblers from around the globe are also arriving. If Kevin can get Joe and Eddie to play together as a two-man team, he can make himself a fortune. The tournament is staged in an abandoned factory within The Pit, an arena the size of an Olympic swimming pool, ringed with tiers reminiscent of the Roman Colosseum, and every game is played to driving music played live by DJs pushing out their craziest beats. Just as in the days of the gladiators, the greed and bloodlust of the spectators is tempered only by the dazzling skill and athleticism of the competitors.

No one walks away unchanged or unscathed from these games or this world. There is more than one way to win, and there is more than one than one way to lose. But first, you have to survive.

THE FILM

Genre - Urban, Action, and Sci-Fi.



Premise - Street soccer is both a game and an art form, something like inner-city playground basketball. It's all about self-expression for the underclass and people cut off from mainstream society. It's like graffiti, using your own body as spray-paint to create something beautiful in the middle of an ugly, trashed-out environment. But it's also a vicious, cut-throat competition, where the goal isn't merely to win, but to humiliate your opponent in doing so.

It's a game that reflects the world around it—brutal, primal, and survival of the fittest.



In terms of the look and feel of SHADOWPLAYERS, it will combine elements of BLADE RUNNER, THE MAZE RUNNER and MAD MAX.

It's a bleak, dystopian world where fantastic wealth looms over bitter poverty.

Crumbling factories share rain-slicked streets with neon-lit clubs, and the next drug, the next fortune, or the next betrayal is always lurking in the shadows.

Given the look and subject matter of the film, it will have both US and International appeal, and will utilize a multicultural cast and crew.

PERSONAL STATEMENT - DIRECTOR - JEFFREY ELMONT

Football (as we call it outside the US) has been a major part of my life ever since I started playing at the age of six. Everything I did was for the game, and I dedicated fourteen years of my life to it, but then I suffered a serious injury and the dream of playing in front of 40,000 spectators was gone.

My ultimate challenge will be capturing the raw physicality and visual poetry of gifted athletes, set against the dark landscape of a crumbling, post-industrial metropolis. This isn't a futuristic drama where the underdog wins in the end, but a story where the winners are the ones who survive until the end.

PERSONAL STATEMENT - SCREENWRITER - DAVID MACGREGOR

I learned most of what I know about human nature and world history playing soccer in Detroit's ethnic leagues. This film is my attempt to convey the level of passion the sport inspires and the way in which people from different ethnicities and backgrounds can connect with one another through a game that pushes the mind, body, and soul to the limit.

It's also a story about the direction the world is headed in, a war of all against all and the stark and bitter contrast between the haves and the have-nots. Set against the crumbling infrastructure of Detroit, a city once called the "Paris of the West," the film will capture the decay and beauty of post-industrial America's mean streets and broken dreams.

STYLE OF THE FILM

The film will combine two different visual styles, much along the lines of RAGING BULL.

The dialogue scenes will be shot in a subtle way, which will allow the actors to give realistic and powerful performances. By contrast, the action scenes will be shot in a more stylized way and will be combined with the sound design to effectively put the audience right in the middle of the action.

The film will be shot in a dark, edgy, and noirish style that will enhance the inner conflicts of Joe and the other characters.

The locations will also add to the feel of the scenes. First, we have the desaturated and cold feel of a city in Northern England.

Then the story takes us to the dark, gritty, and industrial locations of Detroit.



THE SOCCER SCENES




The camerawork will be stylized and dynamic. The camera movements will be smooth and show the game from multiple angles. The audience will not merely see the game, but feel it as well.

When the audience enters the underground world of "The Pit" we will introduce a dark and colorful hyper-reality full of energy. We will create a new kind of arena reminiscent of an empty Olympic swimming pool, with the players walled in on all sides.



The players will play on a stone surface to add the element of danger. Tiered seats for the gamblers and spectators will rise all around The Pit, giving it the feel of the Roman Colosseum in which these players, like the gladiators, are fighting for their lives.




WHY THIS FILM?


Sometimes there is a perfect time and perfect place for a film. This is the time and place for this film. Millions of people play soccer around the world and what makes it the world's game is passion. Away from the bright lights of the World Cup and the pampered world of suburban soccer are street kids trying to claw their way out of the ghetto and paunchy middle-aged men long past their prime who still play because it's in their blood. There has never been a movie that has come remotely close to capturing the raw passion the game inspires in both players and spectators.

This film is also about the increasing gulf between rich and poor in a world where an extra dollar here or there justifies any action and crumbling cities serve as the tombstones of the American Dream. But it's also about hope, about redemption, and about people connecting with one another across cultures. Finally, it's about the best and worst in humanity in a high-stakes, crucible-like world where faith, friendship, and love are the only commodities you can't buy. In this world of shadows people are literally playing for their lives,

THE FILMMAKERS

Jeffrey Elmont - Director

Jeffrey directed the short films, MY PEOPLE and DUISTER & LICHT, which were both awarded Best Short Film by the Netherlands Film Festival.

He then directed the first-ever narrative film about street soccer, entitled LEAGUE OF LEGENDS, starring soccer legend Edgar Davids.


The film successfully raised the profile of street soccer all over Europe and was selected for the 2004 Berlin Film Festival, AFI Fest in 2005, and the European Film Festival in 2007. In 2011, LEAGUE OF LEGENDS was distributed worldwide by Shorts International. He then got his MFA in Directing at the American Film Institute (AFI) Conservatory in Los Angeles. His AFI thesis film, THE SECOND HALF, won the Best Student Film award at the Hollywood Black Film Festival (2009). He also directed the award-winning short film, JUNIOR, starring Larry Gilliard Jr. (GANGS OF NEW YORK, THE MACHINIST, THE WALKING DEAD). His first narrative feature was BODY LANGUAGE, which was released in 2012. Jeffrey also directed the drama/thriller DISCARDED for Tigertail Films, starring John Savage (THE DEER HUNTER) and Michelle Lombardo (ENTOURAGE, MADMEN, and CALIFORNICATION). Currently, Jeffrey is directing commercials for Human Element Productions in Los Angeles.

David MacGregor - Screenwriter

David is a playwright and screenwriter. He is resident artist at Jeff Daniels' Purple Rose Theatre, has been nominated for the Pulitzer Prize in Drama, and his plays have been performed around the world, from New York to Hobart, Tasmania. His work has been published by Dramatic Publishing, Playscripts, and Heuer Publishing. He wrote the screenplay for the dark comedy, VINO VERITAS, which stars Carrie Preston (Emmy-winner for THE GOOD WIFE), just completed a script commissioned for Oscar-nominee Shohreh Aghdashloo, and is currently working on a TV series set in Michigan's Upper Peninsula with Timothy Busfield and Melissa Gilbert.
